

Reaffirming Teaching and Learning in Later Life Weds 1st - Fri 3rd April 2009, at Lancaster University, UK

Although relatively underresearched, our understanding of learning in later life has recently focused on the learner – his or her aspirations, motivations, benefits; and on the policy and provision aspects.

In this conference we wish to extend the picture to include the contribution of teaching, in its broadest sense, including tutoring, mentoring, supervising, coaching - leading learning in all its contexts. There are issues of quality, training and professional development, as well as curricula, design and accessibility of programmes.

In Europe, USA, Canada and China (for instance) whole institutions are devoted to older learners, whereas in the UK informal and voluntary styles of provision are more prevalent. What can we learn from each other in times when public and third sector budgets require increasing creativity with modest resources? What of the burgeoning private sector in third age learning? What are the implications of private education in later life?
